Our teachers have a wide variety of experience in working with students and bring a wealth of ideas and resources to the table. The teachers will work with students both in pull out programs that take place in

take place in separate rooms and in the regular class with the content teacher. Stu-



dents receive service based on their own academic needs. It is a great way to provide the children with extra help to keep them on pace with their peers and to achieve success in the classroom.

In addition to the academic services, Federal Programs has a focus on parent involvement. We have scheduled evening parent meetings during the school year where we discuss reading and/or math strategies with parents, while children who attend spend time with the high school's national honor society students working on crafts or playing games. Title I Math Lab at Logan Elementary

In Math Lab, all of the students have been working hard reviewing the different skills and concepts that have been taught in their regular math classes. Kindergarten students have been identifying different shapes and colors, and they will be learning position words. Students in 1st grade have been using their knowledge of place value to add a one digit number to a two digit number with regrouping. The 2nd graders have been using their addition and subtraction facts to solve problems without and with regrouping. The 3rd graders have been using their multiplication facts to help them solve problems involving area. In 4th grade, the students have been comparing and ordering fractions and decimals. The students in 5th grade have been adding and subtracting like and unlike fractions. The 6th graders have been using formulas to find the area, volume and surface area of different geometric shapes. Students in grades 3-6 have also been reviewing test taking skills and how to solve a variety of word problems in anticipation of the PSSA Test.

Many students seem to lose skills over the summer months. Counting Cheerios or making number cards is a great way to review math skills with Kindergarten students during the summer months. Playing addition and subtraction bingo and reviewing addition and subtraction math facts using flashcards are good ways to review math skills with 1st, 2nd, and 3rd grade students. The students in 3rd grade can also benefit from reviewing multiplication facts. Students in grades 4-6 can benefit from reviewing multiplication and division facts over the summer months. Long division is difficult to master for these students if they do not know their multiplication and division facts.

Please let us know if you would like some additional math ideas and/or flashcard sets. It is important to continue to review the different math skills over the summer months so the students do not lose the skills that they have already acquired.
