Even though we had a late start, I have been very pleased with how our year began. The staff worked very hard over the summer to ensure that the buildings were clean and ready for the students.

This year, we reinstated the alternative education classroom at the high school, which will serve students in grades 7-12. We have found that keeping the students in -house better meets their needs. STAR Program at Green Valley

At Green Valley Primary School, STAR is our Character Education Program. STAR stands for: **Stop**, **Think**, **Act**, **Review**, and these steps are used in making good choices. We kick-off the school year by explaining STAR and the **Decision Making Process** along with introducing our first theme: "**Be Here/Be a Listener**". We explain why it is important to be at school and ready to learn.

"STAR Hearts Grow through Imagination" is the **overall** theme for the 2014-2015 school year. During this year's kick-off assembly in early October, student helpers used their imagination to assemble a life-sized robot that displays our character education words: <u>caring</u>, <u>respect</u>, <u>fairness</u>, <u>honesty</u>, <u>citizenship</u>, <u>responsibility</u>, and <u>confidence</u>. These values are reinforced through all of our themes and during each day's morning announcements. The morning announcements also encourage the students to use their imaginations and highlight different careers each month that the students can aspire to be when they grow up.

During our "Be Friendly/Be Polite" theme, we introduced our Anti-Bullying Program. One of the components of this program is to teach our students how to handle and resolve conflicts by using our "Work It Out" strategy. To support our Anti-Bullying Program, I applied for and received a grant from the Marcus L. Ruscitto Charitable Foundation to host a performance of the "Josh and Gab" Show. The Green Valley PTO provided the funds for a second show for our children so only two grades levels attended each performance. This presentation is an interactive musical comedy bullying awareness program, and Josh and Gab were impressed with the responses of our students when dealing with conflict and why it is important to not be a bully. We keep the anti-bullying message alive by incorporating their catchy lyrics and tunes—at our STAR Assemblies and sometimes on morning announcements. Our students take an Anti-Bullying Pledge at school, and our parents are given detailed information about the strategies we use and how they can reinforce them at home.

I was thrilled to have the second grade students help present the "**Be Prepared**" theme. By using the tune from Carly Rae Jepsen's song, <u>Call Me Maybe</u>, they wrote their own words to reflect different ways to be "prepared". The students did an awesome job, and they are always so excited to perform in front of their peers. Other grades will be presenting and performing at future STAR assemblies.

During the first week of school, each classroom teacher takes their students' pictures to be displayed on the STAR bulletin board by the office when a student is the STAR of the week. One of the main reasons for our STAR Assemblies is to recognize the students that have been chosen as STAR students for their accomplishments during the theme. Besides being chosen as the STAR of the week, each student can also earn PAWSITIVE Behavior coupons for going above and beyond the normal expectations. During the assemblies, two students from each grade level who have earned PAWs coupons are eligible to receive a prize like a floor size puzzle, football, basketball, or board game just to name a few. Last year, every student that earned a PAWs coupon was eligible to win two Season Passes and a Parking Pass to Sandcastle Waterpark for the 2014 summer season. In addition to the prizes the students earn for being a STAR student and the PAWs prizes, Perfect Attendance certificates are awarded at the end of each grading period to support our "Be Here" theme.

We always teach our students that "STAR Hearts Give". Green Valley students sponsored a food drive in December to collect non-perishable food items for our three local Food Banks: Ma's Pantry, Community Action Center, and Holy Angels Parish in Wilmerding. As we have done many times in the past, each Food Bank received multiple boxes of food. They are always so appreciative of our donations since the need is always increasing. We will be sponsoring another service project in the spring.

Following an application process, which includes an essay and teacher recommendation sections, students are interviewed by a team of teachers to fill several positions including a store manager, an accountant, advertisers, inventory clerks and cashiers. The EA marching band brought home a win of 5th place out of 19 bands at the Atlantic Coast Championships, ACC, in Harrisburg, Pennsylvania. The ACC was the biggest competition the band attended this year. Many large schools attended this, and EA was not expected to place as highly as they did.

Mr. Rosco was overjoyed with this season, especially since 18 of the 40 members are in their first year of marching band, such as freshman Seth Fuller. Seth enjoyed his time this band season saying, "I would definitely do it again. I feel proud of myself and everyone else in the band."

Senior Dylan Jackson was also very enthusiastic and shocked about the placing. He did not expect to go as far due to the younger students participating in the band.

Miracle Brocco, junior at East Allegheny and drum major, stated that this was "the best season I've done so far," in her five years of participating in the marching band.
