The Future Is Mine (TFIM) held a toy drive and fundraiser for the kids at the Children's Hospital of Pittsburgh. They received 400 toys and \$300 in donations. The fundraiser was held from November 27th to December 7th. With monetary and toy donations combined, TFIM raised over \$2,000. To participate, students donated \$1 and got to decorate an ornament to hang on the tree in the front of the school. The money raised went towards buying breakfast for the parents of the

patients in the hospital. All of the toys that were donated were delivered to the hospital and

handed out to the kids by hospital staff.

TFIM is a group of students that focus on bettering their futures, their community, and inspiring the younger generation. Students in grades 10-12 are voted in by other members and the sponsor, Mr. Stahurski.

TFIM's President Starr DeJesus loves the toy drive because "everyone [at Children's Hospital] gets a Christmas." TFIM is also Starr's favorite club, because they "get the chance to get younger kids involved and make a difference." In addition to this fundraiser, TFIM often attends field trips and seminars with other schools' groups to learn about leadership and careers. East Allegheny's TFIM group spends most of their time at Logan Elementary speaking with younger students.


